

SURE, DRAFTING SOFTWARE SAVES TIME. BUT ISN'T ACCURACY WHAT MATTERS MOST?

Legal software is designed to help attorneys and other legal professionals complete legal tasks, such as drafting documents, more efficiently.

And while it's true drafting software can help you be more efficient, isn't accuracy really the most important thing when it comes to drafting litigation documents?

According to a recent ALM® study ... **Yes.**

In December of 2015, ALM conducted an online survey of law firm attorneys regarding their use of legal drafting software and their attitudes about it.

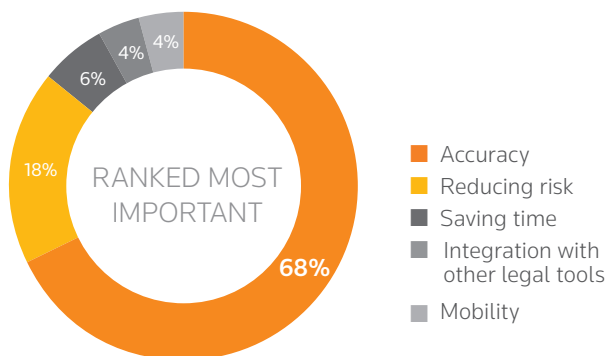
The study specifically looked into what is most important to attorneys when drafting documents, among the following considerations:

Accuracy
Reducing risk
Saving time
Integration with other legal tools
Mobility

ALM STUDY: ACCURACY IS MOST IMPORTANT



Attorneys were asked to:
Rank the order of importance of the five considerations when drafting documents.

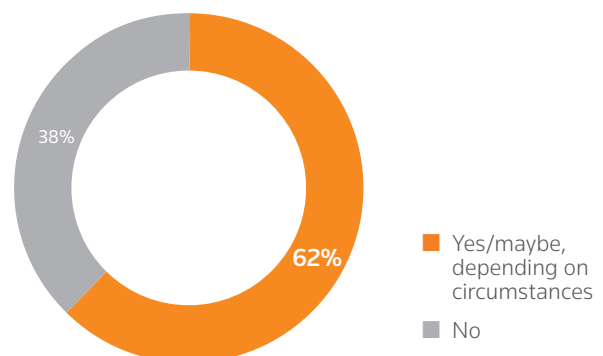


ACCURACY + REDUCING RISK = 86%

Accuracy was by far ranked most often as the most important consideration. It was rated either first or second 92% of the time. When coupled with reducing risk (which goes hand in hand with accuracy), they account for 86% of the top vote.

But even though accuracy is considered the most important consideration, attorneys don't always have the time they'd like to devote to it.

Attorneys were asked:
"Would you ever skip legal document proofreading steps to spend more time focusing on cost-effective litigation?"



Only 38% said they would never skip a proofreading step, meaning 62% said they would skip proofreading steps, depending on circumstances.

What this tells us is that in today's hectic law office, there's a good chance proofreading steps will get skipped. So there's a need for attorneys to be confident in the proofreading steps that do get followed.

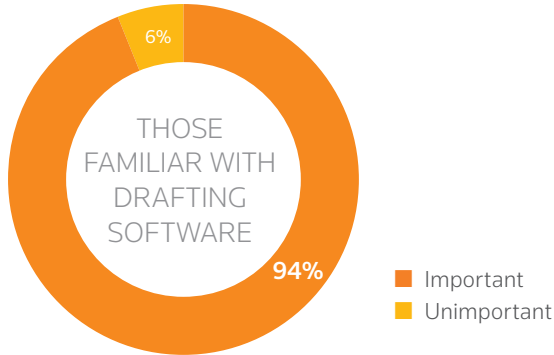
EFFICIENCY AND RISK AVOIDANCE ARE IMPORTANT TOO.



Having integrated technology can help attorneys be more efficient, which is most likely why the ALM study found that integration with other legal resources was considered a very important feature for drafting software. There is also agreement that using the right drafting technology can help mitigate risk.

Attorneys were asked:

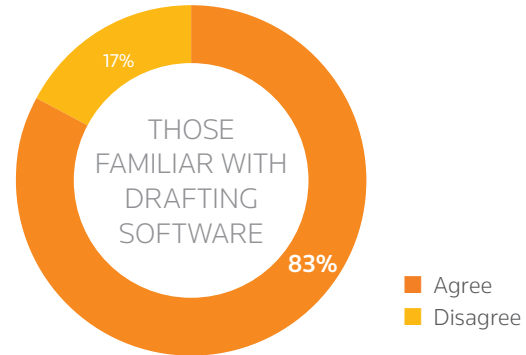
“How important is it that legal drafting software integrate with your legal research, case files, and other documents?”



Most attorneys reported that integration was important for drafting software. In fact, when you isolate the results among those attorneys familiar with drafting software, 94% said it was important.

Attorneys were asked:

“To what extent do you agree that drafting software mitigates any of the risks associated with document drafting errors?”



Of those familiar with drafting software, 83% agreed that drafting software mitigates risks, indicating a high level of confidence in drafting software.
